g. During May targets in Roumania, Italy, Austria and France were attacked by the 460th Bomb Group (H). Oil refineries at Ploesti and A/C Factories at Wiener Neustadt were in the truest sense strategic objectives, in that they deprived the enemy of material and equipment with which to fight the war in any theatre. Railway targets in N. Italy and SE France had more nearly tactical significance, because they cut German supply routes and destroyed stores of use to the enemy against the 5th and 8th Armies. Likewise, the M/Ys in Roumania had the tactical importance of aiding Russian troops, as well as the strategic job of interrupting shipment of oil to Europe. Two missions to Valmontone were wholly tactical, in direct support of our own Ground Forces. Three times during the month of May the Group hit the far distant and well-defended target of Ploesti and four times it hit targets in the Wiener Neustadt Area, as heavily defended as any section of Europe with the exception of Berlin. Outstanding among the missions was the bombing of Treviso M/Y, in Italy, when the Group put down well-nigh perfect bomb pattern, 60.8% of the bombs falling within 1000' of the aiming point and 97.2% falling within 2000'. Another mission which exhibited exceptional bombing accuracy resulted in the destruction of the Components Plant at Neudorfl, Austria. Here 62.4% of the bombs fell within 1000' and 81.7% within 2000'. The bombing accuracy throughout the month of May ranked third of all the groups in the Fifteenth Air Force.
