If we do go-what do we find?

First of all the 483rd WWII B—17 Bomb Group is holding their 34th reunion there the week of October 10th through the 17th. That's a big draw



The history of a Western settlement, like Kansas City, pretty much helps develop a town's culture, and so it is with our destination this fall, Kansas City Missouri.

Lewis and Clark first stopped there on the way west on

June 26th 1804. Clark who had a good eye for a future landing place remarked so in his daily journal. In 1821 Missouri came into the Union under the Missouri compromise as a slave state. Thus when the frontier's men, mostly of Scottish/Irish stock and from Kentucky headed west to this new state many brought along their slaves. The majority of these hearty, tough, independent folk brought their personal values with them to hack out an existence in this new, fertile and virgin land.

From these early years, a true semblance of civilized society was hard to come by; from the 1820's through to several years after the Civil War. The undercurrent of slavery pitted against the free slavery factions, coupled with a lawless western frontier post mentality, gave rise to a sordid assortment of thugs, bushwackers, jay hawkers, cut throats, "Border ruffians", and "Bloody Bill" Anderson, all roaming the states of Kansas and Missouri, like John Brown, Quatrill Raiders, and Jessie James to name a few. Into this mix of roaming mayhem, a local settlement grew and prosperedas City. And thanks to "Bobbed Wire" cattle couldn't be driven now to market, so the railroads came to Kansas City by 1851, the town was incorporated, put on the map, the raging Missouri River was filled with a flotilla of steamships bringing new and eager folks yearning for a better life. So with this background laid the foundation of what places are there today.

Kansas City—"Heart of America", "manure on its feet and wheat in its jeans" was a fair assessment in early times of Kansas City. Today we will find these places of interest, some connected to the past but alive and well today, and others of more recent additions for your entertainment.



Truman An American Original

Harry S. Truman May 8th 1884—Dec 26th 1972

"The Buck Stops Here"

"If you can't stand the heat then get out of the kitchen"

"If you want a friend in Washington: Get a DOG!"

On April 12th 1945 the vice President of the United States, Harry Truman, was summoned to the White House. He was told by Eleanor Roosevelt that the President had died and he would now be sworn in as the 33rd President of the United States. Harry Truman recalled the moment, "that I felt the entire weight of the whole world had suddenly dropped on my shoulders." Thus began the Presidential odyssey of one of the least expected political figures to ascend to the highest office in the land.

Most of us, and for many, like Marion who was born in 1934, two years after FDR began as our 32rd President, had never known any other President. FDR had lead us through the depression, over-hauled the government for the good of the people, prepared us for WWII, and strongly led the nation thru this world wide struggle for democracy and freedom throughout the world. But that Great War, raging on two fronts, Europe and the Pacific theatre, was not yet concluded with victories. Germany was yet to surrender and Japan was still in firm control of her homeland. We all expected, the frail and in poor health, FDR to be at the helm of state and lead us through to the final victory. But fate stepped in the way and suddenly the nation was thrown into a great national mourning, citizens questioning, some feared, the task of national leadership needed with an unknown at the President's desk-Harry S. Truman, who just a mere ten years earlier had been a country Judge in Independence Missouri. Just who was this sixty some year old fellow with coke bottle glasses and certainly not the lilting and stentorian voice of FDR?

Harry S. Truman began his life's odyssey in a farm house not far from Independence Missouri, on May 8th 1884, by 1900 when he was just 16 he began to take an interest in politics, attending with his father the 1900 Democratic convention and continued this interest in local public service with the building of a network of contacts. Then in April 1917, America declared war on Germany. Truman, who had been a member of the Missouri National Guard, signed up, appointed a 1st LT in the artillery, went overseas, promoted to Captain of his artillery unit which distinguished itself in combat. While in Paris in 1919,

Truman became one of the founding members of the American Legion, an affiliation that would serve importantly in Truman's political ambitions.

He was back home by May 1919, he married Bess Wallace in June of that year, started a habadashry, failed, and ran for County Judge in 1922, defeated, reran in 1926 and was elected. Truman was making a name for himself as a good county administrator from his position as County Judge. The Pendergast Political Machine of nearby Kansas City took notice and after some haggling picked Harry Truman to run for U.S Senator as a Democrat for the State of Missouri in 1934. He Won!

It was customary with the Pendergast Political Machine to spread the political spoils around; therefore, Truman would be out after one term (6 years). Harry Truman balked "I'm now my own man!" He ran for a second term in the 1940 election and won again.

FDR was building the "Arsenal for Democracy" even though the U.S was staunchly non-interventionists in Europe's struggle with Hitler, FDR was still getting the nation ready just in case and lend leasing war materials to Great Britain. War

production had started in the U.S, then Pearl Harbor Dec 7th 1941 and it was full speed ahead in war production. Truman was now a seasoned senator and was Chairman of the Senate Military Affairs Committee with committee assignments that led to uncovering of profiteering, waste and fraud in government

military supply contracting. Even though FDR may have been somewhat irked by the Truman Committee Aggressive Investigation, FDR took notice of the damaging newspaper accounts. The Truman Committee received unanimous praise from the press and elevated Truman to grace the cover of Time Magzine: "America's First Line of Defense". Truman was becoming a mentioned name in hierarchy of Democratic politics. Thus he was on the list of possible Vice—President Candidates on the fourth term ticket of FDR in the election of 1944.

Historians and biographers all have grappled with what and why FDR finally chose Truman as his running mate, FDR never said, but he chose Truman (I have my own reasoning, I believe Truman's Presidency reveals why FDR chose Truman).

Harry Truman had been Vice President for 82 days before his sudden call to the White House. The Constitution says that the duties of the Vice-President is to take on the role of President upon the death of the current President; nothing else. And until the most recent time, mostly beginning with the term of Al Gore, Vice-Presidents were relegated to the tasks of attending State Funerals and meeting foreign Dignitaries visiting the U.S. Calvin Coolidge, who like Truman, became President upon the death of Warren G. Harding, in August 1923, said "there is nothing to say about the office of the Vice-President"! John Nance Garner, who had been the speaker of the House of Representatives and became Vice-President under FDR in 1933, said the office of VicePresident "isn't worth the price of a pitcher of warm spit". So it is not surprising to find that Truman came in the Presidency completely uninformed on many very important domestic and foreign secrets of the government in handling the on-going worldwide conflict. He knew nothing about the development of the atomic bomb, but Truman turned out to be a fast learner!

But his first big opportunity on the World stage was something of a false start. The war in Europe ended in just weeks, the Potsdam conference soon followed. Truman was thrown in with the other members of the big three-Churchill and Stalin. Truman misjudged Stalin, "A man I believe I can work with". Harry would not make that mistake again. Europe

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was carved up as spoils of WWII. Germany was cut in half and the Soviet Union would eventually control the Eastern half of Europe, dubbed by Churchill as the "Iron Curtain"!

Truman came home and begun the next 7 1/2 years of his Presidency and left a Presidential Legacy that propelled him to near

great status; behind, Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and

Here for the convenience of brevity, are some of President Truman's lasting domestic and foreign accomplishments.

The order to drop the atomic bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki were obviously prompted by the terrible loss of U.S soldiers (mostly Marines) lives lost in the bloody battles to take the islands of Iwo Jima and Okinawa. The dropping of the first and only atomic bombs, immediately caused Japan to surrender.

After WWII the Marshall Plan to rebuild Europe under the supervision of General George C. Marshall was established. Truman knew that defeated Germany and other European nations needed to get back on their feet and also keep the red menace from taking over. He even revived Herbert Hoover to help administer the food and material supplies, an unheard of gesture from a Democrat, but that was Harry "Put the best men in charge who have past accomplishments" (Hoover's record in food distribution after WWI) Europe was rebuilt.

But further south and east communist agitation was raising havoc in Greece and Turkey. These countries were ut to topple in favor of communism.

Truman started what became known as the Truman Doctrine and helped Greece and Turkey throw off the red menace. In my opinion, it was the only time, then and since, that nation building has worked; ever since we have failed in our meddling in other country's affairs in Latin and South America, Iran, and woefully our adventure in Iraq and now the endless quagmire in Afghanistan.

Continuing his Truman Doctrine he backed the noncommunist factions in Italy in 1948 and saved Italy from becoming a red state. Back home in 1947, over the objection of General Eisenhower, Truman integrated the armed forces. To Harry Truman, you don't study a problem that needs fixing-just fix it. Eisenhower resigned as head of the

Even though Missouri came into the union in 1821 as a slave state and many a Missourian, the Truman family included, used the "F" word in referring to those of the black race, Harry Truman felt the negro who were natural born citizens of the U.S should have equal rights like white folks. Truman attempted to get a bill through congress to that end, but was rebuffed by a filibuster from Senator Strom Thurman of South Carolina. The bill was pulled. The Civil Rights act would now have to wait until 1964 under President Lyndon Johnson.

In the WWII conference Germany was cut in half— East and West, but Berlin was stranded in East Germany as an open city to be administered in sections by the western

s and the Soviet Union. Then in 1948 Stalin closed the highway out of Berlin, which put Berlin 100 miles from nowhere. What to do? Starve? Give up? Not to Harry Truman! He without hesitation started the Berlin airlift operation. Some thought it was a foolish idea. The airlift turned out to be an extraordinary success. After ten months, the Soviets threw in the towel and the road to Berlin was reopened.

In 1947 Truman saw the need and participated in the formation of the new state of Israel.

By 1948, it was now election time. Thomas E Dewey, governor of New York, who had been defeated by FDR in 1944, was savoring a 2nd chance to gain the White House. To the Republicans it would be a breeze against poor old Harry. The Democrats had no choice but to back their sitting President. Truman chose as his running mate, to somewhat balance the ticket, Senator Alben Barkley, of Kentucky, a fairly elderly fire brand at the stump who could raise any crowd to their feet. Harry Truman, though it was nearly midnight in the convention hall in Philadelphia, galvanized the delegates with a rousing "We can Win!" speech that set the even-

tual exhilarating tone of the upcoming Presidential campaign.

The Truman campaign for the presidency in the fall of 1948 was certainly one for the history books. The President, though always behind in the polls and with little backing from the press, mounted an aggressive campaign to meet

the people via the Presidential Train. It came to be called, first derisible by Tom Dewey as a "Whistle Stop" tour, a town too small to stop at—just whistle when the train goes by. Unless, of course, there is a crowd, but Harry Truman was the President dubbed to be on the losing side. The crowds came out and soon warmed to Harry's "give 'em hell speeches". No matter where or when, Harry and Bess were out on that rear platform to meet with folks.

On the last shoving off, the "Whistle Stop Tour" from Chicago thru Detroit and upstate New York and down to its culmination in New York City, the crowds became bigger and bigger. By the time the President got to New York City the crowds were pushing a million strong. Jim Haggerty, Truman campaign manager, remarked or maybe to the President—"With huge crowds like these, I think we have it made, Mr. President". This was on a weekend, the election would be the following Tuesday.



In the meantime, newspapers and pollsters had stopped forecasting—about two weeks before Tuesday's balloting. Dewey was ahead in all the polls. He will win. Only Time Magazine's political gurus questioned the presidential election forecasts. The Chicago paper "The Sun" was so sure of Dewey's win that they

went to press early—with the bold headline: Dewey Defeated Truman" thus ended one of the biggest upsets of a presidential election. Everyone had underestimated Harry Truman, except Truman himself. He would read about the results in the morning. After all, the president had led in early returns from Maine and Vermont and never trailed in the count. So goes history.

In June 1950 communist North Korea invaded South Korea, Truman did not hesitate, he ordered U.S forces to meet the North Korean invaders. Otherwise without U.S action along with the United Nations, South Korea today, a thriving nation, could be like North Korea is today. Truman put General Douglas MacArthur in charge. General MacArthur's military genius drove the North Korean forces back to the Chinese border. Then a bad turn of events, the Chinese came into the conflict and helped the North Koreans drive the U.S and United Nation South. Our retreat was costly and ugly. The question then, should we go after the Chinese and cross the border and get in a fight with China? But this is for National Diplomacy not the province of generals. General MacArthur was getting adamant in his demands that we should go after the Chinese also. The great and popular commander was now over stepping his boundaries to President Truman; Truman had no other choice but to sack the most heroic and popular general the Americans maybe have ever had. It took a lot of guts to fire MacArthur, but Truman did it, and took the consequences. His Cont'd Page 6, see Truman

Here are some historical tid—bits about the locals Colorful History

- ✓ Artist Frederic Remington sold his first painting in Kansas City. The 23 year old arrived here in 1884.
- ✓ In 1904 Lyda Burton Conley studied law and became the first Native American female lawyer in the country, She used her new degree to petition Congress to pass a bill prohibiting the removal of the Huron Indian Cemetery in downtown Kansas City, Kansas
- ✓ The City Union Mission received a much needed boost from a most unlikely patron when in 1934 a 92 year old bordello owner Annie Chambers was moved to tears during a funeral sermon by Reverend David Bulkley. She deeded her opulent brothel to his cause and her residence at Third and Wyandotte Streets was converted into a women's shelter.
- ✓ One of the World's most successful companies started at the YMCA. In 1910, 18 year old Joyce Hall arrived in Kansas City from Norfolk, Nebraska with a shoebox of postcards. (Now of which we call Hallmark!)
- ✓ At one time Alexander Majors's Pony Express
 Freight and Stagecoach Company employed 4,000 circuit
 riders, including 15 year old wagon—master Billy Cody. But
 by 1860 the telegraph and railroad spelled doom for the
 operation, ant "The Great Bullwhacker" lost his fortune. In

1895 the entertainer, now known a Buffalo Bill Cody, made his former employer part of his Wild West Show

- ✓ Some of our city's liveliest history happened in nightspots along 18th and Vine during the Jazz Age. You can relive those days—to a more refined degree—at the district' American Jazz Museum; the Blue Room, which doubles as a museum and nightclub; and during 12 O'clock Jump Jazz Jams on Saturday night at the Mutual Musicians Foundation. - ✓ Where will you find the only monument and museum
 in the world dedicated solely to World War I? It's not Washington DC, or Normandy—it's the 217 foot tall Liberty Memorial right here in Kansas City!

popularity plummeted to the lowest of lows. All of this in a way made
General MacArthur a bigger hero. A heroic homecoming with a ticker tape parade in New York City coupled with the dramatic address to members of Congress that maybe the best—culminating in "Old Soldiers Never Die—They Just Fade Away!"

In the meantime Harry Truman's tenure as the 33rd President was nearing its finality. By Jan 20th

1953, when General Dwight D. Eisenhower took office, Harry Truman would leave by train for Independence Missouri and would become the city's most favored son. And over time the record of Harry S. Truman, almost 8 years in leading the United States, would reveal real lasting stature of their common man from the state of Missouri. Ed Note: No matter your polital beliefs, with the exception of perhaps George Washington, I doubt any other President had to face the challenges and decisions that Harry Truman did in what we now refer to as the "honeymoon period" - his first 100 days as President. Many try to get their programs in place duringd that time period - but what was demanded of Harry was another matter. I think it was best stated by Eleanor Roosevelt after telling Truman that FDR had died. Harry in offering his consolation to the widowed Eleanor Roosevelt, asked, "Is there anything I can do for you?" Mrs. Roosevelt responded, "Is there anything we can do for you? For you are the one in trouble now."
